

Easy to check and difficult to counterfeit

With their enhanced security features, the new €5 and new €10 banknotes are even more resistant to counterfeiting. And like the banknotes of the first series, they're easy to check. Just follow the 'Feel, Look and Tilt' method.



1 FEEL

- Feel of the paper** – The banknote is crisp and firm.
- Raised print** – Feel the short raised lines on the left and right edges of the banknote. The main image, the lettering and the large value numeral also feel thicker.



2 LOOK

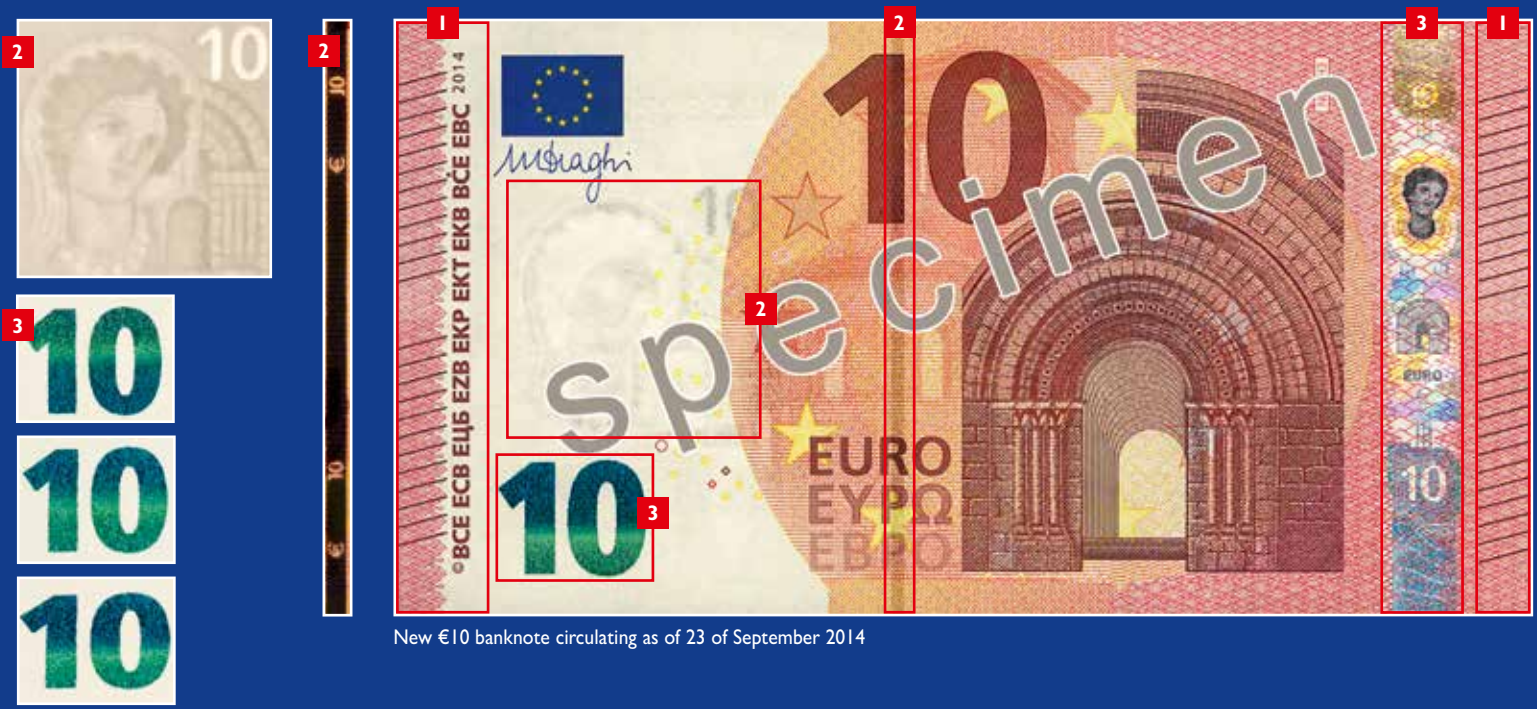
- Portrait watermark** – Look at the banknote against the light. A portrait of Europa, the value and a window become visible. Put the banknote on a dark surface and the light areas become darker.
- Security thread** – Look at the banknote against the light. The security thread appears as a dark line.



3 TILT

- Emerald number** – Tilt the banknote. An effect of the light moves up and down the number. It also changes colour from emerald green to deep blue.
- Portrait hologram** – Tilt the banknote. A portrait of Europa, a window and the value appear in the silvery stripe.

Since their introduction in 2002, euro banknotes have become one of the world’s most trusted means of payment. To maintain that trust, the Europa series incorporates the latest banknote technology.

A gradual introduction for the new series

The Europa series banknotes will be introduced over several years. The new €5 was introduced in 2013 and the new €10 will be issued as of 23 of September 2014. The banknotes of the first series will circulate alongside the new ones until further notice. Even when they cease to be legal tender, they can still be exchanged for an indefinite period at any of the national central banks of the Eurosystem.

The “face” of the new euro banknotes

Portraits have traditionally been used in banknotes all over the world, and research shows that people tend to recognise faces intuitively. The Eurosystem chose to put a portrait of Europa in the watermark and the hologram of the new series of euro banknotes. Europa is a figure from Greek mythology. The portrait was taken from a vase at the Louvre in Paris which was found in southern Italy and is over 2,000 years old. This portrait was chosen because it has a clear association with the continent of Europe and also adds a human touch to the banknotes.
